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

Of course, being integrally involved in a live production, whether it's helping with set design, costumes, performing or backstage management, is marvelous. 

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Hey, Gang! Let's Put on a Season!

How are Aurora Players shows chosen? Choreographer Martha Graham once said, "Theater is a verb before it is a noun, an act before it is a place." Before the final product is performed for you here at the Roycroft Pavilion, our shows are first a verb through the hard work of our Play Reading Committee.

The Play Reading Committee, or PRC, can be considered one of the most important committees within Aurora Players. This committee recommends our three shows for mainstage productions in a single season, as well as shows for special engagements including Theatre in Hamlin Park and a holiday show.

The PRC consists of five to seven Aurora Players members or volunteers who may have directed for Aurora Players and understand the production and technical process. The committee works under the guidance of a committee chairperson. The members have technical knowledge and / or expertise in production, limitations for production, acting, costumes, lighting, music, technical support, set design, etc. Members serve on the PRC for no longer than five years, volunteer for at least two shows per season in any capacity and understand the production and technical limits of the Aurora Players.

This committee solicits submissions of the show proposals from the general membership, past and present directors, previously unselected directors, and the WNY theater community. They read and evaluate all submissions based on the complexity of the production in relation to our capabilities. Finally and importantly, since not every show is right for our organization, the PRC must consider the balance between directors' show submissions and the best interest of Aurora Players and its mission.

It is perhaps the art of selecting a balanced season that can be the biggest challenge. Play Reading Committee member Mary Eckstein shares her personal experience the PRC. "When reviewing submissions, the group takes great care to consider which submissions would appeal to the AP audiences, actors and the overall good of the organization. This process can prove to be a challenge if multiple submissions are viewed as a good choice to build a season, when only three will be selected. The PRC wants prospective directors to know that just because their submission was not selected for a particular season that it does not imply that their submission was a poor choice."

Once decisions on the submissions are finalized, two possible season selections are drafted and submitted to the AP Board for final consideration and decision making. Not long after the selections are submitted, the PRC begins the process again for our next season. We certainly would not be able to present the

caliber of shows at AP without the hardworking members of our Play Reading Committee!

Do you have a play or musical you'd like to direct for Aurora Players? If so, we invite volunteer directors to submit a musical or play for the 2024-25 season. Prospective directors may submit up to three plays. Please visit our website at www.auroraplayers.org or email the PRC at scripts@auroraplayers.org for more information.

This season's performances are the culmination of the Play Reading Committee's vision, and we are continually grateful for being able to share that vision with you. So on with the show and on with the season!



THEATRE IN HAMLIN PARK



Theatre In Hamlin Park's 4th Production: THE JUNGLE BOOK

The trees of Hamlin Park were turned into a jungle for Theatre in Hamlin Park's fourth production, *The Jungle Book*. The story, by Joseph Robinette, is based on the 1894 collection of stories by Rudyard Kipling and intertwines the beloved tale of a lost boy Mowgli, a menagerie of jungle animals, and the red flower (fire) with scenes of 16-year-old Rudyard Kipling as he fights through his own jungle attempting to win the school writing contest by writing *Mowgli's Brothers*.

Director Rebecca J. Caufield brought together a cast of 15 talented actors from across the WNY region. Actors ranged in ages from 11 to 70 with each playing 2-4 characters. Wolves and monkeys dashed from one side of the stage to the other and actors often had a mere 60 seconds (or less) to change costumes before their next entrance.

Caufield says: "This cast is like a family to me and *The Jungle Book* is a show with family at its heart. Whether that family is given or chosen, we are all on a mission of self-discovery to find where we fit in this jungle we call life, all while enjoying the adventure to get there."

While the park was the ideal setting for this show, it did not come without obstacles, the biggest being the weather. Rehearsals were held longer at the Nativity Lutheran church due to the



cold nights of early summer. Once in the park, the Jungle team was often forced to either perform confined to the small stage outside or move the entire rehearsal Once in public production, all show weekends were marked with threats of rain. Every Saturday saw at least one downpour either in the hours preceding or right during set-up time, pausing all activity. However, the clouds eventually cleared and the show went on. Fortunately, only one show was moved to the Sunday rain date. Social media was used to keep any potential audience informed and despite the often soggy park, over 1700 people attended the four-weekend run. We thank audience members for their generous donations

each year, which serve to keep this free program alive.

Theatre in Hamlin Park would like to acknowledge, with great thanks, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Brunson and Mr. and Mrs. Gary Stillman for their generous contributions toward the purchase of the new sound equipment used during this year's production. We are so very grateful to have this improvement to the Theatre in Hamlin Park experience as we continue to bring families together with an accessible theater experience for all ages. \blacksquare

Director's Note

Directing my first show with Aurora Players has been a thoroughly enjoyable project. I have been directing plays for Hamburg High School for 25 years and have been performing with Aurora Players for 10 years. Comedy is my favorite genre, and I particularly enjoy farce. *One Man, Two Guvnors* has all the elements of a classic farce: it's zany, fast-paced, physical and bawdy. I am convinced you will love these characters; they're not good people, but they are totally lovable.

One Man, Two Guvnors is a modern translation of The Servant of Two Masters written in 1746 by Italian playwright Carlo Goldoni. The Servant of Two Masters is an example of commedia dell'arte, a style noted for exaggerated stock characters and much improvisation by the performers. With classic commedia dell'arte, the playwright would invent a situation, and the characters — such as the buffoonish servant, dim-witted daughter, miserly father, and a jealous lover — would improvise the story; then, in between scenes many of the performers would showcase another entertainment skill such as singing, performing physical 'bits', playing instruments, often unrelated to the main story. Later, in America and throughout Europe this developed into vaudeville or the variety show. Our performers really took this style to heart.

This story takes place in 1963 Brighton, England. We open at the engagement party of Alan Dangle and Pauline Clench. However, the party is interrupted by servant Francis Henshall, whose employer (guvnor #1) is the notorious London gangster Roscoe Crabbe, who is Pauline's former fiancé. Roscoe was thought to be murdered; however, this is not really Roscoe, but his twin sister Rachel in disguise, coming to Brighton to collect on her brother's dowry. Rachel's boyfriend, Stanley, is Roscoe's killer. He also employs Francis (guvnor #2). Both Rachel and Stanley are looking for each other in Brighton, but Francis tries to keep them apart so as to not jeopardize his two jobs. Having two jobs increases his chances of eating — he's constantly hungry. His appetites (for food and love) are what drives this farce.

I am extremely grateful to all the talented people who helped make this such a fun experience. A great big "thank you" goes out to our crew, including our set designer, builder, costumer, lighting engineer, producers, stage managers, prop masters, hair stylist, media specialists, graphic artist, artistic painters, fight coordinator, choreographer, musicians, photographer, the Aurora Players Board, and play reading committee. I also want to thank my incredibly understanding and supportive wife, Amy, for the many years I have spent away from home and in a theater, performing or directing, over the years. Most especially, tonight, I want to thank my wonderfully funny and enthusiastic performers, who worked very, very hard every night to make this a wildly entertaining show.

Marc Ruffino – *Director* – Marc Ruffino has been involved in theater for over 25 years. He has been an English teacher since 1995 and a high school director since 2000. His first show with Aurora Players was in 2013, as he was cast as the murderous mastermind Tony Wendice in *Dial M For Murder*. Since then, Marc has performed in numerous plays for AP including *Towards Zero*, *The 25th Annual*

Putnam County Spelling Bee, and **Bus Stop**. He also won three acting awards for his roles in **Grease**, **Present Laughter**, and **Amateurs**. Marc has also appeared on stage with Lancaster Opera House, Desiderio's Dinner Theatre, Rocking Horse Productions, and Shakespeare in Delaware Park. This is his first time directing for AP, but he directed this show for Hamburg High School in 2017, but, of course, a much tamer version. He is very much looking forward to bringing this hysterical show to the Aurora Players stage.



Les Bailey – *Harry Dangle* – Les has appeared in or directed over 100 plays and musicals during his theatre career! In the past, he also served as President of the Board of Trustees for Niagara Regional Theatre Guild. Over the last five years, he appeared in such AP favorites as: *Clue: On Stage* as Colonel Mustard (2022), *And Then There Were None*, and *Bus Stop*. Favorite productions with other

theaters include *Sleuth, I Do, I Do, The Crucible, The Odd Couple, Young Frankenstein* and *Something Rotten*, among many others. Also an experienced director, he has directed such shows as *Camelot, Man Of La Mancha, Fiddler On The Roof, The Miracle Worker, Tuesdays With Morrie, Steel Magnolias* and, most recently for Niagara Regional Theatre Guild, *The Crucible, 12 Angry Men, The Miracle Worker* and *Witness For The Prosecution*. You may have also seen Les in more than a dozen TV commercials. Having managed three customer service departments for FedEx Trade Networks, Les is now retired and enjoys golf, gardening, reading, and tennis. A native of Niagara Falls, Les resides in Cheektowaga with his lovely wife Carol, without whose support he would not be successful.



Michael Breen – Charlie "The Duck" Clench – It's wonderful to have Michael on the AP stage again, having last been seen in 2018's Present Laughter. He has most recently performed in American Repertory Theater of WNY's 2022 and 2023 productions. His AP credits are too vast to list, but some favorites include Barefoot In The Park, The Lion In Winter, A Midsummer Night's Dream and Guys

& Dolls. He has earned AP's Best Actor and Best Supporting Actor Awards three times each over the years as well as a Buffalo Theatre Artie Award. A Life Member since 2005, Michael has directed numerous shows for AP, including five(!) productions of A Christmas Carol, two productions of It's A Wonderful Life, as well as Our Town, Fiddler On The Roof, and The Wizard of Oz to name a few. Not only an actor and director, he has produced or stage managed over ten AP productions and chaired both Publicity and Play Reading Committees, resulting in five Working and Service Awards. As a mentor for young actors, Michael directed 70 high school productions before retiring, winning 11 Kenny Awards. One of Michael's passions is a novel he is writing, which is in its third draft. "I'm a gangster in this role, but I'd like to think my character is still a decent man as criminals go! This script is so witty and the crazy jokes come so fast and furious that audiences will need to really listen to catch them all."



Kelsey Giampoala – *Dolly* – Although a veteran actor with AP's Theatre in Hamlin Park (TIHP), this is Kelsey's first appearance in a mainstage show with Aurora Players since *Pirates of Penzance* in 2015. Eric's other favorite onstage credits include: AP's *Bright Star* (Jimmy Ray Dobbs), *The Drowsy Chaperone* (Robert Martin), *The*

25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee (William Barfée), **Sweeney Todd** (Tobias) with Lake Plains Players, and Harvey (Elwood Dowd) and **The Importance Of Being Earnest** (Jack Worthing) at the Lockport Palace Theatre. In real life, Eric is an attorney at the U.S. District Court in Buffalo. When not busy with work, shows, and taking care of his family, he spends what's left of his time taking business classes, tinkering at the piano, and singing. Working as an Operations Agent for Delta Airlines, Chris is proud to be part of this love letter to Commedia dell'Arte. He'd like to thank Marc for this opportunity to work together again, and Amanda for her unwavering love and support!



John Kehoe – *Lloyd Boateng* — John brings his talent to the AP stage for the fourth time since only 2022! Along with treating Aurora Players volunteers to a comedy improv performance last April, John was last seen in *Rumors*, as the frantically funny Ken Gorman. Prior to that he brought his energy and comedy to AP's *Clue: On Stage* as

Wadsworth, for which the cast earned a TANYS Excellence in Ensemble Acting award. He also appeared as Colonel Cathcart in *Catch 22* with Subversive Theatre Collective (2019). He has been a member of ComedySportz since 2004 and has performed in numerous plays, films, and stage productions throughout his more than 20 years in theater. John also wrote *420 The Musical*, which has been workshopped in NYC. In his spare time, John owns and rides a Penny Farthing high wheeler bike and performs a one-person improv show called *Anatomy of Something Unseen*. Of his time on stage, John says, "Funny; I don't openly laugh that often whilst in a play because I'm too focused on my role. But there are many parts in this one that just got me during rehearsal. This play demonstrates the genre of farce perfectly!"



Kit Kuebler – *Pauline Clench* – Kit is thrilled you could make it to her engagement party! This is Kit's third production with Aurora Players. You may have seen her as Daphne Stillington in *Present Laughter* or as Cherie in *Bus Stop* before it was unfortunately cut short by the pandemic. As director Marc Ruffino has said, this show was influenced by Commedia dell'Arte – an Italian comedic theatrical

form that always uses the same character types (the servant, the master, the lovers, etc.) to tell a hilarious story. Kit actually studied this form at the Accademia dell'Arte in Tuscany, Italy during college, and has greatly enjoyed tapping into what she learned there. Several other notable on-stage credits include **A Midsummer Night's Dream** as Hippolyta (Shakespeare in Delaware Park) and Helena (Irish Classical Theater), **Our Town** (American Rep), and **As You Like It** (Syracuse Shakespeare in the Park). During the day, Kit is a creative writer at an advertising agency. I'm cursed with constant natural animation, so playing Francis lets me be myself on steroids. The fun is in the lunacy!"



Brian Tabak – *Alan* – Brian is also new to the Aurora Players stage, but not to theatre. His roots are firmly planted in the world of comedy, having been in over 1,100 ComedySportz Buffalo improv matches since 2004, while also serving as Creative Director of the organization from 2011-2018. He frequently performs with Niagara Regional Theatre Guild, recently appearing in the classics *Guys and*

Dolls, **Brigadoon**, and **Noises Off**, and is scheduled to perform with the company in spring 2024 as Charles Condomine in **Blithe Spirit** and The Creature in **Young Frankenstein**. A self-described board game aficionado (go on and challenge him - he dares you), Brian is also nearly two-thirds of the way through both his quest to visit all the US National Parks and to see the Arizona Diamondbacks play in every MLB park. On playing Alan: "After spending many of my teen years learning to be less like Alan, I now find myself digging deep to reconnect with the pretentious, deficient (yet passionate) twit I'd packed away so long ago. It's been good, silly fun!"



Jacob Walters – *Ensemble (Police Officer, Bartender and Boy Scout)* – AP is pleased to welcome Jacob for his first performance on the Roycroft Pavilion Theater stage. Though new to AP, he participated in many productions while attending Hamburg High School, including: *Shrek the Musical* (Lord Farquaad), *Musical Comedy Murders of 1940*,

Pride and Prejudice (Mr. Darcy); **Clue: On Stage** (Mr. Boddy), and **Into The Woods** (Jack). Jacob plans to attend SUNY Fredonia to pursue a degree in Theatre Production. Winner of Critics' Circle Best New Play), HONEYMOON SUITE (Pearson Play of the Year), UNDER THE WHALEBACK (George Devine Award) and TOAST (all at the Royal Court); THE GOD BOTHERERS (Bush Theatre); SMACK FAMILY ROBINSON (Newcastle Live!); THE MENTALISTS (Lyttelton Loft, National Theatre); and MR ENGLAND (Sheffield Crucible Theatre). His radio plays include "Of Rats and Men;" "Yesterday;" "Unsinkable;" and "Robin Hood's Revenge."

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
DIRECTOR'S NOTE






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Proof

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
