It's a hilarious farce set in 1930s Cleveland, where chaos ensues when a renowned opera singer goes missing before a crucial performance. Ken Ludwig's first play, **Lend Me a Tenor** was produced on Broadway and in London by Andrew Lloyd Webber. It won two Tony Awards and was called "one of the classic comedies of the 20th century" by The Washington Post. **Lend Me a Tenor** is an uproarious comedy of errors, filled with witty dialogue, madcap situations, and unexpected twists, quaranteeing non-stop laughter and entertainment for audiences seeking a night of rib-tickling fun.
